

Responsible Conduct of Research

St. Thomas More College (STM) requires all research conducted by its faculty members to conform to the highest ethical standards and follows the research ethics policies laid out by the University of Saskatchewan (USask), including the USask <u>Responsible Conduct of Research policy</u>.

STM faculty work directly with the <u>Research Ethics Board</u> (REB) of the University of Saskatchewan providing access to administrative systems, procedures, and controls.

Any research or study conducted at STM or undertaken by STM faculty that involve human subjects (USask Human Research Ethics Policy) must be reviewed and approved by the USask Research Ethics Board (REB) before the research project commences.

Additionally, any research, funded and non-funded, involving **Saskatoon Health Region** (Saskatoon Health Region – Research Approval Process) resources and/or is conducted in Saskatoon Health Region facilities (including research conducted in its affiliates and community-based organizations) must receive formal Operational Approval (operational approval form) before it may begin.
