PRESIDENT'S **M**ESSAGE

On April 7, just before the end of the winter term, STM held a President's Appreciation and Dean's Year-End Reception, our first large social gathering since the pandemic began over two years ago. It was a great celebration, with 55 people attending in person and others online, where awards to faculty, staff, and students were given out and recognized. After a winter term that many faculty felt was their most difficult teaching experience of the pandemic, it was especially impressive to see the large number of faculty nominees for teaching excellence awards based both at STM and the University of Saskatchewan.

It would be easy to remember this past year in terms of the challenges and disruptions that marked it, but there were also new achievements that we will build on and develop long after this past year fades into the background. There is no way to mention all of them here, but I want to highlight some that stand out as important for the way they will shape our future.

First, through two further waves of the COVID-19 pandemic, we showed that we could return to the classroom safely. Even after the long-awaited return to campus in early February, we never had to retreat from the physical classroom back to a virtual platform. As we look forward to a full return to campus life in the fall, we have gained tremendous confidence that we can adapt to further waves of the pandemic (if and when they arise) and continue to offer high-quality instruction. Our faculty have now mastered the art of teaching online, reclaimed the art of teaching in person, and developed their own hybrids of the two to meet the changing needs of students. Our staff have likewise learned how to offer their services remotely when required, from student advising to pastoral counselling to the annual audit.

We also added new resources to enhance our academic mission. In December, we celebrated the naming of our new Centre for Faith, Reason, Peace, and Justice after Irene and Doug Schmeiser, in recognition of Irene's \$1 million pledge to support the Centre. By the spring, we had secured approval for a new certificate program in Peace Studies, in addition to new programs approved in Religious Literacy and Ukrainian Studies. At a time when the Russian invasion of Ukraine continues with no clear end in sight, these new programs provide vital perspectives on the conflicted world in which we find ourselves in. We also completed a faculty appointment in Archaeology that will align that discipline with History and add a new focus on Egyptology. After a review of our library conducted last year, we secured approval to recruit a new academic librarian to oversee the Shannon Library. Meanwhile, the Dean and Department Heads made important progress on a faculty hiring plan that will align future academic hirings with the objectives of our College Plan.

With regard to our Catholic mission, our Director of Mission and Ministry led the process of revising the College's Catholic Identity Statement. The new Statement breaks new ground by claiming our Basilian heritage while reorienting our work to the Diocese of Saskatoon and the bold directions set by Pope Francis. At the same time, our Campus Ministry team led the College community in discussions initiated by Francis' Synod on Synodality, and we will soon be submitting a synthesis of our findings to the diocesan synod summit that begins in May.

Our work in Indigenization saw us celebrate the first National Day for Truth and Reconciliation last September, which will now become an annual observance. In January, we welcomed Michelle Blackmon of Canoe Lake Cree First Nation as the newest member of our Board of Governors. Michelle serves as Education Partnerships Manager at Saskatoon Tribal Council and will bring further expertise in Indigenous ways of knowing to our efforts to Indigenize the culture and curriculum of STM.

The past year also brought confirmation of unmarked graves at former Indian Residential Schools that were operated by Catholics. This history highlights the need for Catholic institutions, including STM, to listen with humility and to learn from this painful past. As these discoveries were announced, we issued statements expressing our sorrow at these tragedies and restated our commitment to pursue truth about our shared history and to continue working toward Reconciliation.

In March, we reached a milestone on this long journey: after extensive discussion with our Indigenous Advisory Circle and with our bishop, Elders A.J. and Patricia Felix assembled a teepee in our chapel. Against the background of



William Kurelek's mural depicting the Saskatchewan prairie, the teepee is a powerful symbol, but it is much more than that. It is a spiritual resource for Indigenous students, an educational opportunity for all of us, and a sign that STM is on the path to Reconciliation. The teepee is still so new, and so significant, that – like Kurelek's mural when it was first unveiled - it will take time for us to adjust to its presence and absorb what it will ultimately mean for us. I encourage all who can to come see it and take in the teachings about it.

We are always planting seeds for the future, but in the process of getting there, there are also transitions. Two extraordinary staff members retired this year: Kathie Jeffrey, who served as our College's first Human Resources Manager, and Gail Morrison, our Executive Assistant to the Dean. Both of them joined STM in 2006 and made tremendous contributions in their roles and well beyond, as active citizens of the College. As one who worked closely with both of them, I thank them for their selfless service to the College, and I wish them both great happiness and fulfilment in their retirements. We look forward to organizing a formal farewell for them in the fall.

As we turn the page on 2021-22, I offer a heartfelt "thank you" to all the devoted members of the STM community who made sure that we made it through the second (and hopefully last) pandemic year, not just by the skin of our teeth, but with some achievements of which we can be proud.

DEAN'S MESSAGE

It has certainly been a challenging year for many of our students, staff, and faculty, with some reporting that this past term has been the most challenging of all. After a full year of remote learning in 2020-2021, we eased our way back into in-person course delivery last fall. By January 4th, faculty, staff, and students who had been working remotely were required to show proof of vaccination for an in-person return to campus. However, due to Omicron's heightened transmissibility and an increase in case numbers throughout the province, the winter term started a few days late as we prepared yet again for remote delivery, which continued until February 7th. Many in-person courses became a mix of face-toface and online delivery, which helped keep the number of positive COVID-19 cases in the classroom low throughout the term.

In the midst of all of this transition and uncertainty, the Dean's Office remained very busy. We conducted our first tenure-stream hire since 2019 and were very pleased in March to announce the appointment of Dr. Caroline Arbuckle, an archeologist, to the Department of History. In addition, Dr. Peggy Schmeiser and Dr. Richard Manley-Tannis were appointed as adjunct professors in the Department of Religion and Culture. Three degree-level certificates in Peace Studies, Religious Literacy, and Ukrainian Studies were approved by the Academic Programs Committee of University Council, and, on February 28th, the STM Board of Governors, approved the following recommendations from the Tenure and Promotions Committee: i) that Dr. Henri Biahé be granted renewal of probation; ii) that Dr. Carie Buchanan be awarded tenure and promoted to Associate Professor; iii) that Dr. Daniel Regnier be promoted to Professor; and iv) that Dr. Sharon Wright be promoted to Professor. Congratulations to Henri, Carie, Daniel, and Sharon!

In December, the College announced the wonderful news of Irene Ositis-Schmeiser's donation of \$1 million to support the named Irene and Doug Schmeiser Centre for Faith, Reason, Peace, and Justice. Our sincerest thanks to Irene! The Centre's co-directors, Chris Hrynkow and Gertrude Rompré, had a busy March partnering with St. Paul's College Winnipeg and Campion College Regina to offer a new online event entitled "Prairie Symposium for the Common Good: Ecology and the Common Good" and presenting the De Margerie Lecture Series on Christian Reconciliation and Unity. This year's lecture entitled "In Conversation: Perspectives on Ecumenism, Reconciliation, and Pathways for Renewal" featured a dialogue between Archbishop Don Bolen of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Regina and Bishop Chris Harper of the Anglican Diocese of Saskatoon.

In February, the Prairie Centre for Ukrainian Heritage's annual Mohyla Lecture entitled "The Chornobyl Event: Ecology, Media and the Anthropocene" was given by Dr. Adrian Ivakhiv. As you might imagine, the Centre has been extremely busy during the past two months providing support to our Ukrainian students, staff, and faculty. I wish to thank the Centre's Interim Director, Nadya Foty-Oneschuk, for all her work and dedication.

During the last week of classes, we hosted our first in-person formal event since December 2019. The President's Appreciation and Dean's Year End Reception was a wonderful opportunity to come together as a community and celebrate the accomplishments and service of our students, staff, and faculty. Students Taylor Spock and Abbi Cross received the Basilian Scholar Award, and Dawn Deguire, from Muskoday First Nation, received a university

Indigenous leadership award. Linda Huard won a USSU 2021-2022 Academic Advising Award. Shakti Brazier-Tompkins received the STM Teaching Excellence Award and Henri Biahé receiving the Margaret Dutli Professional and Community Service Award. Congratulations to

STM's Professional and Community Service Committee is very pleased to announce that this year's winner of the Margaret Dutli Professional and Community Service Award is Henri Biahé. Dr. Biahé, a professor in the Languages, Literatures, and Cultural Studies department, has been an advocate for French language learning and the French culture of Saskatchewan during his time at St. Thomas More College. He has not only been involved with promoting French learning through STM's Recruitment Office alongside Linda Huard by giving lectures to high school students, but he has also been the coordinator of the USask en Francais student group. Moreover, he is one of the creators of the Fransaskois Participatory Research Collaborative (FPRC), a research group that seeks to contribute to the Fransaskois community at a grassroots level, assert that value of the multi-communal French language in Saskatchewan, and promote the literary, artistic and cultural life of the provinces' Francophone community. Alongside Dr. Biahé's commitment to the French cultures of Saskatchewan is his commitment to The Saskatoon Open Door Society and the Black Community of Saskatoon. In his involvement with these communities, Dr. Biahé has begun to work closely with community leaders in order to address the systemic barriers facing these communities and consult on appropriate paths of action needed within Saskatoon.

2021 - 2022 St. Thomas More College (STM) Teaching Excellence Award

Recipient: Dr. Shatki Brazier-Tompkins

STM's Teaching Excellence Award (TEA) annually honours an instructor who has made outstanding contributions to teaching at the College. Students, faculty, and alumni can nominate any instructor teaching in the current year, who is then invited to submit an application package, including a teaching portfolio and CV.

This year's TEA winner is Dr. Shakti Brazier-Tompkins. Shakti was awarded the PhD in English by the University of Saskatchewan in 2017. She has taught at least 24 courses for STM since then, including Writing for Academic Success, and Literature and Composition, Reading Drama, Narrative, and Culture. These are marking-heavy first-year courses in which a wide variety of students enrol, which makes Shakti's successes in them all the more notable. The committee noted her strong student and peer evaluations, her well-constructed syllabi and accessible assignments and handouts, her innovative use of teaching technologies, her careful comments on student work, and other evidence of student success, including notes from grateful students. STM is lucky to benefit from Shakti's outstanding teaching, and we are so happy to confer on her the 2021-2022 Teaching Excellence Award.

Honorable Mentions

Amanda Devitt and Oksana Dudko. Both of these instructors are fairly new to the College, but both presented impressive teaching portfolios, with philosophies of teaching that linked compelling pedagogical ideas to innovative classroom practices.

Amanda Devitt earned a PhD in Classics from McMaster University in 2020. As a lecturer at STM in the 2021-2022 year, Amanda has taught history and CMRS classes. The committee commented favorably on Amanda's capacity to provoke enthusiasm for the classics, especially in engagements with primary materials.

Oksana Dudko is a doctoral candidate in History at the University of Toronto and has taught courses this year in STM's Ukrainian Studies Program. The committee was impressed by Oksana's commitment to student learning through tenuous political times, drawing connections from their learning about the past to reading and responding to the present. NEW GRANTS

Dr. Paulette Hunter: awarded a Saskatchewan Health Research Foundation (SHRF) Connection Grant \$7,500.

Despite decades of pressure for more person-centred models of care in long-term care (LTC), the Canadian public continues to lack trust in the LTC system. This trust was further undermined by relational strain during the COVID-19 pandemic, as LTC residents and their families experienced prolonged and heavily restricted contact. The pandemic has underscored the necessity of a family-centred approach to care as an approach with potential to address and correct the relational ruptures that

took place during the pandemics. A family-centred approach is also a hallmark of a palliative approach to care. This palliative care workshop co-facilitated by the SPA-LTC, SK LTC Network, and Better LTC teams, and their collaborators, provides an ideal venue for engagement and consultation (inclusive of family partners, students, clinicians, and researchers) to improve family-centred care in LTC. This workshop will also provide valuable strategies for strengthening family-centered care in LTC, which can be shared widely within attendees' own networks. This is a unique opportunity to access a national audience of expert consultants to contribute to ongoing research to support Saskatchewan's LTC sector.



THE SYNOD AT STM

In October 2021, Pope Francis convened a global conversation - or synod - about what it means to be a church that journeys together. For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, and Mission invites us all to give voice to our experience of and dreams for the Church. Listening to the Holy Spirit, we are called to dialogue and discern pathways for the Church as we seek to respond to the needs of the world today. While synods are a valuable part of Church tradition they may not be as widely known today as they have been in the past. Essentially, Pope Francis is asking us how the Church can be a better listening and accompanying Church.

The St. Thomas More College community launched the synodal process at a Eucharistic celebration presided by Fr. Jean Baptiste Murhumwa on October 17. All in attendance that Sunday prayed the traditional synodal prayer, Adsumus Sancte Spiritus, asking the Holy Spirit to guide this important process for the Catholic Church.

The Newman Centre Executive responded to the call to participate in the synod by hosting three online conversations for university students on January 27, February 17, and March 24. The student discussions have been engaging, and the participation has been enthusiastic!

STM Alumni also got involved by participating in a conversation held on-line February 15. Participants attended from Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Ontario. The conversation was so rich, and the energy was so positive, that all the participants that evening decided that one session would just not be enough. They met again on March 17 and April 19, to both celebrate St. Patrick and continue their reflections.



Researching "Old" War; Living through "New" War

In summer 2021, I was delighted to receive a Jacyk Postdoctoral Fellowship in Ukrainian Studies at St Thomas More College (STM), especially because the affiliated Prairie Centre for the Study of Ukrainian Heritage (PCUH) is the perfect place to pursue my research about Ukrainian history. My dissertation research examines how continued violence after the First World War and the Ukrainian and Russian revolutions shaped the identities of Galician Ukrainian soldiers. When I began the fellowship, I was excited to work on turning my dissertation into a book project.

What I didn't know is that I would be finishing this research about war and violence while simultaneously living through a full-fledged war in Ukraine, my home country.

My academic year in Saskatoon began with beautiful summer walks and bike rides with my family along the Meewasin Valley. After living through a strict COVID-19 lockdown in Toronto, it was a great way to start the academic year. I was also thrilled about the opportunity to teach two courses: the Soviet Union and Modern Ukraine, and Russian–Ukrainian *Conflict*. In the latter course, I taught students about the complex Ukrainian-Russian relationship that has spanned centuries. In particular, we explored the historical preconditions of the Russian proxy war in Donbas and the annexation of Crimea. We also critically evaluated how the medieval and premodern history of Ukraine has been weaponized in Putin's historical imagination and Russian propaganda.

However, my teaching and research at STM was interrupted by the full-fledged Russian invasion of Ukraine on February 24, 2022. When the war started, I immediately rushed to Ukraine to provide support and evacuate two vulnerable family members. When I transited through Warsaw, I was impressed by the enormous support for Ukraine and volunteer initiatives. I also reunited with distressed friends who had fled the country immediately to keep their kids safe.

At the time, Kharkiv was being heavily shelled, so I volunteered to collect medical supplies for local residents with my friend Roza Sarkisian, a theatre director whose family was trapped in the city. After I arrived in Lviv, Roza and I continued to help Kharkiv residents obtain essential medical supplies. I also continued teaching the STM Ukrainian history course online, incorporating my first-hand experience of the war into the classes

STM support for Ukraine

The Stand with Ukraine rally on campus was well represented by members of the STM community.

The event began with a prayer from Fr. Andre Lalach, STM Campus Minister, and priest with the Ukrainian Catholic Church. Marta Krueger, USUSA secretary, recited the speech given by Dr. Bohdan Kordan at a recent rally in front of City Hall. Dr. Nadya Foty-Oneschuk, Interim Director of the Prairie Centre for the Study of Ukrainian Heritage, also spoke at the rally, urging her fellow Canadians to come to the aid of the Ukrainian people.

In Lviv, several civilians have been killed or injured and local infrastructure has been destroyed by Russian missile strikes. Hearing air raid sirens and sheltering in basements has also become part of everyday life. However, because Lviv is far from the regions hit by direct fighting, it has become a hub for people fleeing from different parts of the country. As a researcher and interviewer, I've joined an international initiative to gather testimonies from such people about their war experiences. When I return to Saskatoon, I hope to begin a new research project to gather and examine the testimonies of Ukrainians who were forced to flee the war and are now starting a new life in Saskatchewan.

Key part of STM history preserved by generosity of alumni couple

The Mosaic Doors

n 1963, Vancouver artist Lionel Thomas designed and produced these multicoloured, enameled copper doors using the cloisonné technique. It was part of the major expansion of St. Thomas More College (STM) that added the library wing and cafeteria. The new wing was officially pened Feb. 6, 1964, and the north doors, often referred t as the Mosaic Doors, became a cherished memory fo nds of students over the years as they bustled STM and the rest of the cam

The design on the door panels, which mirror each other ted to education, the arts and science the Holy Trinity and the development of humankind. The 52 panels represent political science, history, engineering matics, philosophy, soil, language, agriculture education, life above ground, life below ground, p rchitecture, archeology, chemistry, natural history, the Trinity, and at the very bottom of each panel, fire, earth and water, representing – according to Thomas – that out of the lower arises the upper', or 'man's trans

He had been recognized many times over the



Time at STM set up Keith Kratchmer for rewarding life of travel, service

Keith Kratchmer was a young man from west central Saskatchewan when he first set foot in St. Thomas More College (STM) in 1972. What he found was a friendly atmosphere where he fit right in.

While studying for a degree in Commerce, Kratchmer says he spent almost all of his non class time at STM. He favoured its library over others at the university, and also thrived on the fellowship the student community offered him. "I did all my studying in the STM library then socializing downstairs in the open area," said Kratchmer. "Eating lunch, playing cards and meeting with friends to discuss topics of the day, it was a very social, homey atmosphere. So, that's probably what helped me a lot, was the time that I spent at STM." He also frequented the STM Chapel, where he attended many Sunday evening services.

With his degree in hand, Kratchmer took up an articling job at an accounting firm in Edmonton where he obtained his chartered accountant designation. It was then that the travel bug bit, and he and his brother, Terry – one year his junior – set off for a nine month trip through Europe and the Middle East. He estimates they made their way through more than 20 countries.

Upon his return to Canada, Kratchmer came to a realization: "I decided I'd like to do something extra with my life." His uncle had been in Papua New Guinea with CUSO (Canadian University Service Overseas), a few years before that, so Kratchmer used it as inspiration to apply to CUSO himself.

While waiting for a finance related placement, he enrolled through STM and obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree in political science.

Kratchmer returned to Canada in 1992. He worked in Meadow Lake for three years with an accounting firm, moved to Inuvik for a job as a controller for a local First Nations company for three years and then started work in 1999 in La Ronge with an Indigenous radio station, Missinipi Broadcasting Corporation, as controller.

He was active with St. John Vianney Catholic Church, helping with church activities, finances and organizing liturgies. He retired from his job after 20 years and moved to Saskatoon in 2019.

Now 67, Kratchmer continues his faith journey as a member of Holy Spirit Parish and the Knights of Columbus.

He counts many blessings when he looks back on his single life: his faith, his family and friends, his experiences and the wonderful memories of fellowship at St. Thomas More College.

Achimo 2022: a celebration of storytelling and connection

Second installment of popular event proves people love to connect through spoken word

The number of times it has been done on this land is beyond count - friends gathered in a circle to hear stories.

Whether sitting by a campfire under the stars, or huddled under blankets in a teepee on a cold winter's night, they came together to teach and entertain; to laugh and share.

It was done again in the same spirit at STM College recently, when the second installment of Achimo 2022: Engaging Through Stories took place.

Presented by Harry Lafond, the STM Scholar in Indigenous Education, and the Authentic Indigenization Action Group, Achimo 2022 offered an afternoon of connection through storytelling.

"It's an important part of who we are. Not just as Indigenous people, but as human beings," said Lafond to kick off the event. "We are starved, many times, to hear a good story. Moreso during a pandemic."

Lafond said that in Cree there are several words that speak about stories and storytelling.

Some of these words refer to special stories intended to pass on knowledge, ceremonies and belief systems. That is not what this day was to be about, in any direct way.

Instead, he said, this day was about âcimowin.

"This is storytelling. What you do with your four-year-old. What you do with your grandpa or grandma."

Members of the Authentic Indigenization Action Group – which has been working together for about two years - were on hand for achimo 2022. They are: Michael McLean, Gertrude Rompré, Kerry Stefaniuk, Chris Hrynkow, Daniel Regnier, Geordie Cowan and Sherry Richert.

In the spirit of Indigenous protocol, Lafond called upon the committee members to present tobacco and gifts to the guest speakers.

Lafond invited the 50-plus guests to linger afterward for an informal sharing of bannock and jam, muskeg tea, juice and other snacks.

"That's part of storytelling," he said. "Sharing of food and continuing to tell little stories."

First to speak was Tara Millions, a doctoral student and lecturer in the Department of Indigenous Studies at USask. She has a love of stories, he said.

Hip Hop artist Eekwol came with a modern way of communicating, using music, rhythm and words that are constructed in such a way as to tell a story.

David Neufeld, who Lafond called a very special historian due to his passion for the stories of the earth, and the peoples who have lived on that earth, and Louise Halfe, Parliament's Poet Laureate, were also on the program. Well known to the STM College community are Elders AJ and Patricia

Felix, who were situated in the chapel, where a teepee had just been raised.

"The reason we've raised a teepee in the Chapel, is because the teepee has become a place of prayer," Lafond said. "It's a place of sacred thinking. And so, it's there to be used as a place of prayer and reflection. As a place of guiet. AJ and Patricia will tell us about that."

And then, just like it has happened so many times before, the introductions were over, and the room got guiet. The listeners leaned in.

It was story time.

STM Campus Minister Michael MacLean provided background to the new teepee installation at STM following Ash Wednesday mass. "Our STM chapel is situated on Treaty Six Lands, Nehiyaw Territory, and the homeland of the Métis. You will notice a new addition to our chapel. The teepee was erected for Tuesday's Achimo 2022 storytelling event. Through a long process of discernment, we have been encouraged by our STM Indigenous Advisory Circle to house the teepee here in the Chapel, as it is a sacred place of prayer and reflection, as is our chapel. Reconciliation is the work we must take on as a Catholic Church in Canada, and we take that work seriously here at STM. We respect and reaffirm our relationship with the First Nations and Métis people of this area, as we acknowledge that we are all treaty people."

In December 2021, St. Thomas More College (STM) announced a \$1 Million gift from Irene Ositis-Schmeiser in support of STM's Centre for Faith, Reason, Peace, and Justice.

"This landmark gift will enable STM to establish its new Centre on a solid and lasting footing," says Dr. Carl Still (PhD), president of St. Thomas More College at the University of Saskatchewan (Usask). "The Irene and Doug Schmeiser Centre for Faith, Reason, Peace, and Justice will draw new students, new researchers, and new community partners to STM. Through the Schmeiser Centre, STM's unique academic programs will prepare students of all backgrounds to receive an education in the Catholic intellectual tradition, which emphasizes the integration of knowledge and values in an increasingly fragmented world."

More than a decade in the planning, the Centre was officially launched this past January. Director Dr. Chris Hrynkow (PhD) spoke at that time to its goals.

"The Centre has a threefold purpose: To serve as a home for STM's distinctive programs in the areas of Catholic Studies, Critical Perspectives on Social Justice and the Common Good, and Peace Studies; To promote these and faculty; and through outreach to bring the insights and values associated with these programs alive through mutually-enhancing work with community partners."

Ositis-Schmeiser and her late husband Doug, share history and support for the College that go back many decades. Ositis-Schmeiser served 6 years on STM's Corporation, while Schmeiser was named as a Distinguished Alumnus in 2009 recognizing his lifetime of achievement since graduating from the College. Schmeiser served as Dean at USask College of Law and worked extensively nationally and internationally in the areas of constitutional law, legal reform, human rights, and judicial education. The Doug and Irene Schmeiser Scholarship established in 2000 annually supports STM students majoring in Philosophy. As regular attendees at STM academic lectures, and members of the College worshipping community, "we experienced a sense of community and a wonderful extended family," says Ositis-Schmeiser.

Ositis-Schmeiser's gift plans for the College in 2019 were solidified when presented with an update of the Centre development. "The focus and goals of STM's Centre for Faith, Reason, Peace, and Justice, along with its dedication programs with students, community partners, to fostering excellence in teaching, research, **16**

Students will reflect on the causes and structures of injustice and approaches to social change at interpersonal, communal, national, and global levels. As a central concept in Catholic thought on social justice, the Minor will explore the role of the common good in the religious, ethical, philosophical and social science traditions. As part of their course of study, students will be challenged to critically examine historical and contemporary misappropriation and abuse of the constructs of social justice and common good. Through a community service-learning pedagogy, offered in a number of courses, this minor creatively engages faculty, students, and community partners in local and international responses to inequality and marginalization. Cycles of exclusion (e.g., marginalization associated with disability, age, gender, poverty, sexuality, racism, violence, colonialism, post-colonialism, class, speciesism and the environment), urban justice, globalization, and ecojustice are the areas of concentration for empirical, social analyses of social injustice. From these areas of concentration and issues of justice students gain a solid intellectual and ethical grasp of the understandings of the common good. The Minor, consisting of 21 credit units of courses, may be completed in conjunction with any degree in the College of Arts & Science.

Ken was born in Regina into the staunch United Church family of William and Edith MacKay. He was raised and started his schooling in Moosomin.

At the suggestion of a family friend he was sent as a boarder to Campion Catholic High School in Regina for his secondary schooling. He was won over by the studies and social life of a boarding school and became curious about the Catholic Church. After high school he enrolled at the University of Saskatchewan through St Andrews Theological College with thoughts of becoming a United Church minister but was also an occasional visitor to STM down the street.

Fr. Joseph O'Donnell's Shakespeare class was well known throughout the campus and Ken took the class in his second year, then tried out for a part in the Newman drama production of Romeo and Juliet. He was Romeo! In later years he appeared in other Fr. O'Donnell-directed productions -MacBeth, Hamlet, A Man for All Seasons. STM/Newman Club was a friendly community with perks such as lunches at the student-run cafeteria, Ulcers Inc., Sunday night socials, debates and discussions in the old music room, joining the Newman Glee Club directed by Fr. Finn.

As at Campion he was drawn to the chapel – the liturgy, the ceremony and the faith. Eventually he began instruction and was received into the Church in the spring of 1960. The college also brought romantic interest in a young student, Patricia MacKay. They fell in love and married after graduation.

After a short time teaching high school back in Regina, Ken longed for something more dramatic and in 1964 he entered the College of Law.

Upon graduating he articled and spent a year in private practice before joining the Saskatchewan Department of Justice as a prosecutor; the prospect of more time in court was enticing given his teaching career and his passion for acting and theatre.

He did not see prosecuting as a "prove the accused guilty at all costs" endeavour but as an honest search for justice for all. Over his career he appeared frequently before the Supreme Court of Canada and worked

on several national boards involving the reform of the criminal law. He was a Bencher of the Law Society for six

years and served on the Saskatchewan Review Board from 2002 until 2020. He was a bright legal mind who tackled his cases with reason, fairness, and intelligence.

Ken was predeceased by his parents, William (Mickey) and Edith MacKay and his parents-in-law Vincent and Emelda Connor. He is survived by his loving wife of nearly 60 years, Pat, his brother Donald (Connie and children Twylla, Sheila, and Tyler), Pat's brother, Gerry (Beth) Connor and sister, Margaret (Richard) Johnson. Though they had no children of their own, Ken was a special uncle and friend to his nephews and nieces Quetzal, Jesse, Anahi, and Claire Johnson and to "adopted" nieces and nephew Odette, Christina, and Patrick McCarthy. He valued and loved you all.

Ken and Pat had nearly 60 years of love, humour, occasional disputes, travel, adventures, and friends during their life together-still not long enough. He died peacefully in Regina after spending a month at home with all who loved him dearly.
